ELECTION CALENDAR 2020

Feb 15	Fire District elections (some towns)
May 12	Nonpartisan Municipal Elections (some towns)
May 13	Last day to change parties for Primary Election
June 16	Last day to register for Primary Election
July 6	Request mail-in ballot in person until 3 pm
July 7	PRIMARY ELECTION Polls open 6 am - 8 pm
Oct. 13	Last day to register for general election
Nov. 2	Request mail-in ballot in person until 3 pm
Nov. 3	GENERAL ELECTION (including Board of Education for all Camden/Gloucester County towns). Polls open 6 am - 8 pm. Vote-by-mail ballots must be postmarked by Nov 3 if mailed (and received by Nov 10) or taken to an official location by Nov 3.

VOTER REGISTRATION

In Order to Register to Vote, You Must Be:

- A US citizen residing in the district in which you expect to vote;
- A resident of your county for 30 days before the next election;
- At least 17 years old; your registration is marked "pending" and you may vote as soon as you turn 18.

You Are Not Eligible to Vote If You:

- Are serving a sentence, as a result of a conviction of an indictable offense, under state or federal law -- or --
- Have been adjudicated by a court of competent jurisdiction to lack the capacity to understand the act of voting.

When and How to Register:

- Eligible voters are automatically registered when they obtain a driver's license (unless they choose to opt out).
- Registration forms can also be found online and at most county offices. You can now register entirely online (no printer needed!) Visit <https://voter.svrs.nj.gov/register>
- To vote in a specific election, you must register at least 21 days before Election Day (plus county residence requirement above)
- Registration is permanent, however;
 - Someone disqualified who no longer is such must re-register.

Changes of Address or Name

- **Moving within the state:** when you update your driver's license, your voter registration info will automatically be updated, but we suggest calling the Board of Elections promptly to verify your status.
 - If you don't maintain a driver's license, you will need to notify election officials and complete a change of address form.
- **Moving within the county:** either complete a change of address form by 21 days before the next election or, after that deadline, meet with your municipal clerk to process the change.
- **Moving to a new county in NJ:** (1) within 20 days before an election, you can vote at your old polling place (check with officials to verify procedures); (2) more than 20 days before an election, and did not complete the change of address process in time, you cannot vote.
- **If you change your name** by marriage, divorce or court decree you must submit a written statement to the county. Updating your driver's license serves as this written statement. If the change is within 20 days of an election you may vote in that election by signing both names and completing a name change form at the polls.

PARTY AFFILIATION

You may affiliate with a party when you register to vote but this is not required unless you wish to vote in a Democrat or Republican primary election. If you are unaffiliated, you can declare a party at the polls in a primary, or you can declare a party using a form on the county website at least 55 days before the primary. If you are *already affiliated*, you may change to a different party more than 55 days before the primary (you may not change at the polls).

Voting In Person

In 2020 there will be no sample ballot for the General Election. Instead, all active voters will receive a vote by mail ballot with candidates and ballot questions included. You will not be able to vote on the machine at the polls unless you declare that you are handicapped and cannot complete the form. ID is not required to vote but it is recommended you bring a signed photo ID. First-time voters should bring their voter registration card (contact the Board of Elections if you did not receive one).

Vote By Mail

In 2020, for the General Election, all active voters will receive a vote-by-mail ballot. An active voter is one who has voted in at least one of the last two federal elections (those in even numbered years) and whose mail doesn't get returned to the BoE as a bad address.

Return your ballot by mail or in person; if you fail to return your mail-in ballot, you may only vote by provisional ballot at the polls unless you declare that you cannot do so. Mail-in ballots must be received by the Board of Elections before the close of polls on Election Day or postmarked by Election Day and received within one week. There are also ten secure drop off locations open through 8 pm on Election Day. For the General Election you can take your VBM ballot to your polling place as well.
